DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that the Greater Lansing Housing Coalition (GLHC) offers regular Homeowner Education Resource Organization (H.E.R.O.) classes?

Classes are held at the Neighborhood Empowerment Center, 600 West Maple Street, and are offered weekly on Monday evenings from 6-8 pm (bi-weekly in the GLHC'S TUESDAY TOOLMEN

summer months, check for fall and winter dates). Recent topics have included deck maintenance, lock re-keying, and ceiling fan installation. For upcoming classes, please check the GLHC website at www.glhc.org/classes.

GLHC also offers tool rentals to individuals and groups through its Tool Mobile, a mobile tool lending library with an inventory of over 500 tools for your painting, plumbing, and landscaping needs—perfect for community projects and home DIY. Apply online at www.glhc.org/toolmobile. Additionally, GLHC volunteers build accessibility ramps and perform minor home repairs for income eligible seniors and persons with disabilities through their Tuesday Toolmen program. Since 2010, the Tuesday Toolmen have built over 130 accessibility ramps in the Lansing area.

Westside History: WILLIAM HARRISON PIPES, Ph.D.

The Westside Neighborhood was one of the first racially integrated neighborhoods in Lansing. Several of Lansing's African Americans, who made history in a variety of areas of achievement, made their home in the Westside.

We would like to pay homage and tribute to William Harrison Pipes, Ph.D. Pipes was Michigan State University's first African-American professor. Born in 1912 and raised in Inverness, Mississippi, Pipes was the the son of cotton sharecroppers, and was not allowed to attend school in Mississippi after the sixth grade, since high school education was restricted to white citizens in the state. He eventually went to

Tuskegee Institute High School and College in Alabama, earned a Master of Arts degree from Atlanta University and a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan, becoming the first African American to earn a Ph.D. in Speech.

Prior to coming to MSU in 1957, he taught at several colleges, including Fort Valley State College, Southern University, Philander Smith College, and Wayne State University. During his career Dr. Pipes received Rosenwald and Fulbright study grants, and published several acclaimed books, including *Death of an 'Uncle Tom'* and *The English Major*.

Dr. Pipes married Anna H. Russell, who herself taught at MSU and Lansing Community College. They were the parents of three MSU alumni: Harriette Pipes McAdoo, Ph.D., Willetta Pipes Ewing, and William Pipes. The Pipes family lived on the corner of West and Hillsdale. Dr. Pipes remained at MSU until his retirement in 1975 and passed away in 1981.





2017 HISTORIC WALKING TOUR

On Tuesday, June 27th, approximately 60 residents gathered at J. W. Sexton High School to participate in a Historic Neighborhood Walking Tour sponsored by the Westside Crime and Safety Committee. With their comfortable shoes on, walkers embarked on a 1.5 mile route that took them past 16 historic homes built between 1893 and 1940. The purpose of the walk was to highlight the diversity of our neighborhood, learn the history of the Westside, and bring neighbors together.

Safety is fundamental to the health and vitality of communities. People need to know that their children can walk to school without fear. Currently the Westside has the lowest crime rate of any other neighborhood within the city. The Crime and Safety Committee, chaired by Mitzi Allen, wanted to get the word out that the Westside is a safe place to live, raise a family, and attend school.

Andi Crawford, Lansing's Neighborhood Resource Coordinator, led and narrated the walk. Following the walk, neighbors enjoyed a social reception at Letts Community Center. Councilwoman Carol Wood was on hand to answer questions.

Neighbor Spotlight: MELIK BROWN

"Hi Neighbor," began Melik Brown's open letter to nearby homeowners. "You have probably noticed some activity on the corner. We meant to introduce ourselves beforehand, however, things began to move quickly."

For anyone who's followed Melik's career in the past twenty years, this ice-breaking approach to meeting new neighbors should come as no surprise. He's performed as a comedian and actor, hosted a live call-in show, produced hip-hop concerts,



been involved in a wide variety of Lansingarea organizations and associations, and worked as a promoter of places and events of all shapes and sizes. He's been on screen with Elizabeth Berkeley, delivered pizza to Dustin Diamond, and was booed off stage in Toronto "on three separate occasions." Most recently, he's been the face of LansingMade. com, a site devoted to showcasing and highlighting the people, stories, events, and businesses that make up Metro Lansing. Whether he's served you a cocktail at Soup Spoon Café or you've watched him on local television, you probably know who he is. If not, you'll soon see him around.

And he won't be alone. Melik has a loving partner, Jessica, a nurse whose smile "lights up a room" and who softens Melik's "tempermental gruffiness." Together, with Jessi's two children, ages 12 and 8, they're embarking on a new adventure of stripping and refinishing wood floors, pulling weeds, and building a life in the Westside.

Melik may have developed a public persona filled with sarcastic barbs and keen observations, but is clearly humbled at his experiences transitioning into family life, recounting the tears that flowed when Jessi's daughter first asked if she could call him "daddy." Melik and Jessi are expecting their first child together in October, which resulted in conversations about the need to move away from apartment living to purchase their first home. "I'm ecstatic. I tell people that we are blessed. We are very fortunate and thankful and grateful. The kids can't wait to get in."

Although Melik is new to the neighborhood, he's been fascinated by the Westside for some time, particularly with regards to how Lansing's most diverse neighborhood handles racial tension in the age of social media.

"I've been following the Westside Neighborhood Facebook page for a few years now, and it's been interesting," he explains. "I thought I didn't know what I would do if I was ever in a neighborhood like that. Because on one side, I think it's great that people are actively involved. On the other side, people need to understand how

they're miscommunicating, and how what I call 'accidental racism' happens when you're in this pocket, this circle. I've been watching it and seeing how there's a lot of similar things that keep happening, and we're not progressing. And it's just a microcosm of what's happening in the rest of the country."

But Melik is not discouraged by the challenge. "I'm excited, because now you're going to have to deal with me."

Melik has lived in Lansing for decades, but was born in Ohio and grew up in Oscoda ("through an importation program they had," he jokes.) His primary attraction to the Westside is its small-town feel. "I like the fact that it's an active community. It means someone's going to be looking after my kids. I want to feel okay when my kids go around the corner."

However, Melik admits he's coming to terms with the move being such a well-publicized event.

"I've never moved into a place where it's been so public a transition. I'm a very private individual, which is the big misconception of my personality. My public personality came about because I enjoyed doing certain things, but I didn't think through it as a public thing. I just liked doing TV. I just liked doing acting. It took a long time to realize that the stuff I was doing was actually 'of note.' But it's part of my being. It's part of my nature. If I don't do it, I don't feel whole."

Melik's upcoming project is a one-man stand-up special at the Robin Theatre on Thursday, September 14th. "Somehow, mysteriously, I was just voted Top Comedian in the Top of the Town Awards," he observes, referring to the annual City Pulse survey, "yet I haven't done a show in a couple years." It was Melik's first time winning, though he won the #2 spot in the past. "Virg won that year, so I went around telling people 'I'm doing comedy right now, but I'm only second best, so don't expect much."" Now that he's recognized as Lansing's de facto comedic leader, he confesses he'd rather be called a humorist. "Nobody takes a comedian seriously. I



have a lot of things to say that I think are important. We can have fun talking about it, and it can be funny, but sometimes its serious. And that's how this show is going to be. A standup show meets NPR." He smiles, proudly, then laughs. "I just hope I can get 90 people to show up."

Given his continued popularity, that shouldn't be a problem. As long as dust from the floor sander hasn't taken his voice first.



The Crime and Safety Committee is a committee of the Westside Neighborhood Association charged with helping to improve the livability and safety of the neighborhood by sponsoring community safety awareness programs and working to rid the neighborhoods of blight as related to code violations. The Committee provides WNA residents with information regarding crime in the neighborhood and with tips for preventing crime, proper ways to report crimes, and best ways to support our law enforcement officers. The committee partners with LPD, Neighborhood Watch, neighborhood schools, and business owners within the designated boundaries.



Meetings are 6:30 pm on the last Tuesday of the month and held at Letts Community Center, 1220 West Kalamazoo St., Lansing. Our Crime and Safety Meetings provide an opportunity for the public to discuss matters of mutual concern with the police, collaborate on ways to improve police community relationships, and hold the police accountable for achieving desired results.

Using Facebook posts to alert neighbors to crimes and emergencies within our neighborhood is a wonderful tool.

However, developing a plan of action is most effective when done in person at the Crime and Safety Meetings with all necessary parties at the table.

I'd like to encourage you to attend the meetings. It takes all of us working together to make our community safe and free of crime. Hopefully, we'll see your face at the next meeting!


WREATHS AND GARLANDS
